Edwards comes to us with a good reputation as a full back from Neath, the present leaders of the Welsh League.

Commencing as a centre three-quarter with a junior team
—Tondu Juniors—he later joined Aberavon and gravitated to
Bridgend, playing with Glamorgan when with the latter club.

A further change found him in higher company with the famous Neath team, with whom he has completed three years good service. In 1907-8 he kicked the goal at Swansea in the only game lost by Swansea. Last season a dropped goal by Edwards defeated Newport; and he has this season, for Neath, scored two tries from full back.

Other notable facts are the position of reserve to Bancroft for Wales v. France and Wales v. England, besides fourteen appearances for Glamorgan County.

The Welsh writers deplore his departure North, and I hope, when fully conversant with the Northern Union game, that he may surpass the promise he gave in the opening game against Swinton, when his dropped goal and general play received general commendation.
