Official Notes.

The Keighley Match.

Attendances and Receipts at all our home matches have this Season been so fine that the small crowd present on the occasion of the Keighley match presented a quite unusual appearance for our usually well-occupied ground.

Special circumstances were responsible for this state of affairs, in the two facts that an important cup-tie was in progress in the town, and the Lawkholme team at present, unfortunately, offer no serious opposition to the best sides in the League.

With the visiting team of a superior calibre we should have had a greatly increased attendance at Fartown, so that there is no room for the pessimism individuals sometimes indulge in when the highest "Fartown" pitch is not reached on every occasion.

Our team had one of their high-scoring days and amassed 44 pts. to nil, with Jim Davies in the unaccustomed position of scrum half, and the captain vice Davies at outside half.

This half-back formation perhaps did not work with quite the usual

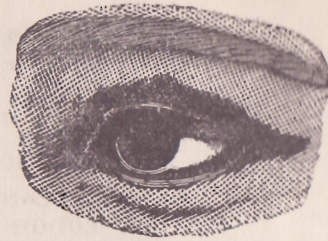
smoothness and effectiveness, but we think both Davies and Wagstaff may be complimented upon much excellent play in the match.

Major Holland showed up splendidly in goal kicking, landing no fewer than seven goals. His work at full-back was also of a capable and trustworthy character.

The appearance of Isaac Cole in the visitors' ranks aroused considerable interest, as the former Castleford man some years ago was a member of the Huddersfield team prior to his being transferred to the Wakefield Trinity Club.

Criticisms have been passed upon our action in not including some of the Reserve players in the team against Keighley, and we may say the Reserves referred to, when playing against Warrington the same day, did not exhibit form which would justify a trial run with the first team. This opinion is not based on report, but personal observation by a member of Football Committee present at the Warrington Reserves v. Huddersfield Reserves match at Wilderspool.

us. We are unanimous in a desire to
get the best out of all our players, and
afford all possible opportunities to
rising talent in our district.

The Halifax Match.

The "local Derby" at Thrum Hall
was favoured in a period of thoroughly
wretched football weather with an
exceptionally fine day. Our friends
out at Thrum Hall have not enjoyed
their usual run of success this Season,
either on the field or financially, and
so they would welcome the turn in the
weather which induced a big crowd to
attend the engagement. The receipts
were announced £345 : 3 : 4; evidence
that the N.U. game has a splendid
following in both towns.

Halifax played their usual hard
game against our team, and all the
old excitement prevailed when the
"blue and whites" were gallantly—
with a depleted team—holding our
men at bay.

Keen contests of this type rarely
produce finished and skilful football,
the robustness of the tackling is an
extinguisher of dazzling play by either
team, again this order prevailed until
near half-time when two smart tries,
followed by successful goal shots, put
10 pts. on the indicator.

Unaccountably weak defence by two
of our backs let in the opposition
directly after the re-start, and Halifax
had rubbed off 5 pts.

It was Huddersfield's game after this
Halifax spurt, and the great features
were the fine forward play of the Far-
town six; splendid long range goal
kicking by Longstaffe; and clever
sharp-shooting by Holland, who also
gave one of his very best exhibitions of
full-back play this Season. His goal
kicking vies with Carmichael's feats—
against Keighley our full back landed
seven goals, and in the Halifax game
five goals, twelve in two engagements.
We hope to see similar success and
sound play from Holland during the
rest of the Season.

The result of the match—Hudders-
field 26 pts., Halifax 5 pts.—constitutes,
we believe, the most complete victory
ever achieved by Huddersfield on the
Thrum Hall ground, though it should
be remembered the Halifax team, from
several causes—injured players and
suspensions—was much below its full
strength. The "blue and whites"
missed the services of their fine out-
side half-back—Prosser, whose play
since he came North has repeatedly
received high commendation from the
critics. Metcalf, Joe Riley and Asa
Robinson were also out of the team.

Fully represented, Halifax would
have been reasonably expected to run
our men closer.

To-day's Match.

To-day's fixture loses some of its
interest owing to the absence of seven
players—Huddersfield five, and Hun-
slet two—who are engaged in the
match at Plymouth. The game should
be a good one even with these heavy
calls upon the interested clubs, and
will afford the players who fill the
vacancies an opportunity of proving
their quality.
