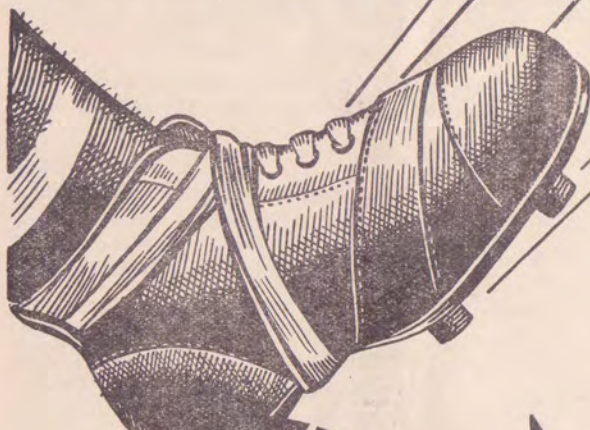

Royston and Fiddes handled first, but when Markham got the ball it was great odds against him scoring. He had distance and a fair number of opponents between himself and the line. However, he made a brilliant run, beating man after man, and then racing past Shankland and planting the ball near the posts to the accompaniment of tremendous cheering, which broke out again and again. Considering we were so many points in arrears at one time, the final score of 15-11 does not make bad reading.

It was that long period of unsteadiness in the first half and early second half that gave Warrington so big an advantage. We shall have to cultivate the habit of settling down quickly and getting in the first knock.
