



THE YORKSHIRE COUNTY CUP

The Yorkshire County Challenge Cup, for which Huddersfield and York meet this afternoon on the ground of the Leeds Club, was first played for on December 2nd, 1905, when Hunslet beat Halifax by 13 points to 3 points.

Ever since the Cup was first put up for competition, it has never failed to attract large crowds. The Clubs have profited, so has the County Committee, and always has the Final pulled in a crowd of a size which has told adequately of the place taken in the game by the Competition, in which today's is the 50th Final.

Huddersfield's record in the County Cup stands out supreme. The wearers of the claret and gold jerseys have been one of the most attractive sides the game has seen. They have played in the Final on 19 occasions, winning the Cup 11 times, which is a record. They won it in seasons 1909, 1911, 1913, 1914, May 1919 and November 1919, 1926, 1931, 1938, 1950, 1952. It will be interesting to see if they are capable of adding the 50th Cup Final to their record; if they do, it will be a fitting honour for their captain–Paddy Valentine 'The famous World Cup Captain,' to have his name engraved on the Cup.

York, who have been going from strength to strength these last few years, are no mean opponents. They have played in the Final four times and have won the Cup three times. The last time they were successful was in season 1936, when they beat Wakefield at Leeds by 9 points to 2. The York team on that occasion was—T. Dingsdale, H. Haigh, W. Welch, A. Hunt, J. Weston, G. Rees, W. Thomas, L. Sharp, H. Field, G. R. Prosser, H. Coldrick, F. Elias and N. Fender.

There are quite a few well known personalities in that team which followers of the game will well remember. Dingsdale, Rees, Thomas, Prosser and Fender, all great names in that period.

The York team today is a very sound one, and contains such stars as Basil Watts, a member of the World Cup winning team, E. Dawson, England's loose-forward a year ago, J. Robinson who, on several occasions, played out-half for Other Nationalities, W. Riley, coach and captain, who is a very capable leader and a schemer in general, and the £3,000 signing from Castleford-Denzil Webster, who is one of the fastest centres in the game and has a terrific side-step.

The teams are so well matched that in my opinion it is anyone's game. Let us hope it will be a "classic," and may the better team win.



- Harry Plunkett Signed from Keighley Albions last season as a centre-threequarter Age 20. 6ft. 12st. 3lb. Playing on the wing, fast and a good tackler, very promising.
- Austin Kilroy Centre-threequarter. Now doing his National Service. Age 22. 5ft. 11in. 14st. 11b. Very strong, plays a typical centre game. Has a good strong break through.
- Alan Colburn Centre-threequarter. A Leeds boy from Buslingthorpe Vale. Age 20. 6ft. lin. 144st. Big and strong. Had quite a lot of first team experience. Very forceful. *
- Roland Barrow Centre-threequarter. Signed from Oldham three seasons ago. Age 26. 5ft. 11in. 13st. 5lb. Playing good football this season. Always looking for an opening. Gives his wing plenty of opportunities.
- Michael Sullivan Wing-threequarter. Age 23. 5ft. 10in. 11st. 2lb. Played in several International matches. Played in both World Cup Matches in France and Australia.
- Ray Cecil Stand-off or Centre. Age 24. 5ft. 6in. 12st. 7lb. Signed from Newport end of last season. Good on defence and a very quick service.



- B. Smith Age 23. 6ft. lin. 12st. 12lb. Was signed from the Rugby Union and was born at Halifax.
- D. Webster Age 24 5ft. 11in. 13st. Born at Castleford and signed from that club last year at a £3,000 fee, a real speed merchant.
- G. Smith Age 23. 5ft. 8gin. 12st. Born at Wakefield.
- S. J. Flannery Age 21. 5ft. 10in. 11st. A local product who has come on by leaps and bounds since joining the club.
- J. Robinson Age 27. 5ft. 7in. 11st. 7lb. Born in New Zealand and gained International honours with Other Nationalities.
- W. Riley Age 30 5ft. 4½in. 11st. 6lb. Was signed from Swinton in 1949, is coach and captain of the team.

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CAN WE RETAIN THE ASHES?

Earlier this year I was in Australia with the British World Cup Team and saw our boys beaten by the Kangaroos. Supporters in this country, having seen the last Australian team in action over here, were astounded when they heard the result of this vital World Cup game.

When, then, did we slip so badly?

Firstly, I can say that the form displayed by the Aussies in Sydney was far, far superior to some of the poor exhibitions put on over here by their last touring team. They were stronger, fitter and much more purposeful. In addition, they benefited from injuries sustained by two players in Brisbane. Sounds paradoxical but it's true because Brian Carlson substituting at full-back and Ken McCaffery at scrum-half, both playing in unaccustomed positions, were our opponents' best players on the day.

Joining forces with Australia's improved form to contribute our downfall was Lady Luck. After seventeen minutes, just as we were fighting back after a slow start and had wiped out four of a five points deficit, Alan Davies got hurt and left the field.

If this had not happened I think we would have won the game. Davies was in tip-top form and was sorely missed.

However when half-time came the score was only 10 points to 6 against us and we were by no means beaten.

Early in the second half Boston was crippled and almost simultaneously a wild pass and poor tackling gave Australia an unexpected 5 points and the game was lost. The final score meant nothing as we had only ten fit men for the last quarter of the game.

However, every cloud has a silver lining and Australia's win has given added zest to our tour next year.

Strong as Australia undoubtedly are in their own country I think we can beat them. We have players who are individually superior and I think we will also have the "edge" in teamwork.

Skill is not enough!

If we are to bring the Ashes back next year every British player must go on the field prepared to give and take hard knocks. The Aussies are tough—make no mistake. They "give" plenty but one must admit they are not squealers—they can "take it" too.


During our short tour I saw enough of our players in action to realise that in the World Cup '18' we had the nucleus of a British team which could beat Australia in 1958. Whether they make the trip will depend largely on their club form this

We hear rumours that in club football these days players once they see a game is lost tend "to turn it in " and some of the large scores which have been registered have been quoted to support this view.

It is my most sincere wish that if there are such players then none is Australia bound next May.

Victory will only be achieved if we field thirteen men whose second nature it is to try hard to the final whistle and who above all have the will to win.

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
